Listed below are suggestions for costumes. We encourage students to use clothing that may already be at home, borrow from family members or look in charity shops. Students have suggested sites such as Temu/Shein for costumes at low prices. Students may want to pick someone famous from their assigned decade and base their costume on that person.

Students can disguise themselves as much as they want with wigs, sunglasses, jewellery, bracelets, make-up etc. but the costume must be comfortable and appropriate for dancing in. No masks allowed. If skirts are short, then shorts must be worn underneath.

	Costume Suggestions	
Tory (1960s)	Ponchos, beads, peace signs, medallion necklaces, chain belts, polka-dot fabrics, long bubble sleeves, flared jeans, tie-dyed shirts, work shirts, Jesus sandals, headbands, mini-skirts, A-line dresses, business-like suits – look at the Beatles, vibrant colours especially orange, yellow gold and green. T-strap shoes, big-hair do's (Bee-hive) etc. psychedelic patterns, turtle-neck jumpers, polo shirts, chino pants. Feel free to mix and match or base your costume on someone famous in the 60s. Think Elvis, Dusty Springfield, The Beatles...	
Shelton (1970s)	Sequins, flared shirts, flares, 'hippy' look, shirts with bold prints, floral patterns, wide collars, wrap tops/dresses, clogs, flared pants, maxi-dress, knee-high boots, boho blouses, chunky heels, etc. Think ABBA style! Feel free to sparkle!	
Bective (1980s)	Leg warmers (bright colours – can be easily home made – cut off bottoms, bright long socks), bandanas, denim, anything with shoulder-pads, blazers, shiny tracksuits, tulle skirts, suits. Think Madonna, Michael Jackson, Bon Jovi, Cyndi Lauper...neon colours.	 
Ferns (1990s)	Oversized t-shirt, baggy jeans, gold chains, baseball caps, blazers, double denim, doc martins, flared pants, shiny tracksuits, v baggy pants, bright colours, bucket hats, shades, cargo pants, jumpsuits, over-sized jacket, combat boots, grunge-look – torn jeans, denim overalls...thick headbands, tube tops, bomber jackets. Think George Michael, Vanilla Ice, Kylie Minogue etc	 
Glenstal (2000s)	Black leather jackets, v neck sweaters, jeans, anything really goes... big chunky runners, tracksuits, cowboy hats, ripped jeans, trench coat, shirts, blouses. Think Katy Perry, Justin Timberlake etc. Anything really goes in the 00s!
